THE WESLEY COVENANT PRAYER

I am no longer my own, but thine. Put me to what thou wilt, rank me with whom thou wilt. Put me to doing, put me to suffering. Let me be employed for thee or laid aside for thee, Exalted for thee or brought low for thee. Let me be full, let me be empty. Let me have all things, let me have nothing. I freely and heartily yield all things to thy pleasure and disposal. And now, O glorious and blessed God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, Thou art mine, and I am thine. So be it. And the covenant which I have made on earth, Let it be ratified in heaven. Amen.

(as used in the Book of Offices of the British Methodist Church, 1936).

In 1755, John Wesley began leading Covenant Renewal services. These services were times in which people would remember the covenant made at their baptism–a covenant to serve God with all one's heart and soul. Wesley found that these services were very encouraging and powerful for everyone involved, and soon they began being held in numerous Methodist societies.

Over time, many British Methodist churches began to hold these services on New Year's Day or the first Sunday of the year since these were natural times of renewing commitments. These services continue with regularity in British Methodism today. While only a small number of congregations in America hold these services each New Year, the order of worship for a Covenant Renewal service can be found on page 288 of the UMC Book of Worship.

While John Wesley admitted that he was not the originator of this prayer, it has served as a powerful tool for spiritual formation in the Methodist church over the last two centuries.

The Trumansburg Food Pantry is under the umbrella of and sponsored by TAC. The Pantry offers a free food distribution every other Monday for residents of the Town of Ulysses, including when the date falls on a holiday.

The goal of the Trumansburg Food Pantry is to provide good quality/nutritious free food for families in need who include: working but with low income, single parents, unemployed, disabled and Senior Citizens. Funds used to purchase food come from many sources: Trumansburg Area Churches; private donations; United Way/via the Ulysses Community Council (you can earmark your United Way donations for the Trumansburg Food Pantry—we do receive those monies); CROP WALK – usually held in October each year -- (25% of income from the WALK comes back to our local pantry); and other fund raising activities (some county wide); as well as grants from County, State and Federal agencies. We also accept donations of non-perishable foods from many organizations and individuals throughout the. Food is also purchased for the Food Pantry through the Southern Tier Food Bank.

Volunteers from the host churches, and others, assist with the bi-weekly food distributions and manage the Ulysses Food Hotline (387-8260).

The Jacksonville Community United Methodist Church is the host church for January and February. There are still volunteer openings available on the signup sheet located on the table in the back of the sanctuary.



### FOOD PANTRY COLLECTION FOR 2017

January – Oral Hygiene items (toothpaste, toothbrushes, mouthwash, Fixodent, etc). February – Lunch Box items (Snack Pack pudding, cans of soup with pop tops) March – Cleaning supplies (dish detergent, laundry detergent, bars of soap) April – Boxes of rice, plain and mixes, instant potatoes, pasta side dish mixes. May – Rolls of toilet paper June – Oatmeal, Boxes of cereal (other than corn flakes and cheerios) July – Personal care items (baby wipes, combs, brushes, nail clippers, deodorant) August – Condiments (flour, sugar, ketchup, mustard, mayonnaise, salad dressing)
